At the commencement of the academic session/year, the academic calendar is prepared by the College in consultation with all the Head of the Departments. A teaching plan is prepared by every department as per the prescribed syllabus by the University taking into account the number of teaching hours that are available during the Semester. There is sufficient flexibility in the teaching plan to adapt to the exigencies that may arise during the course of teaching. As the College is affiliated to the University of Jammu, the curriculum is enriched wherever possible within the limitations of the university norms. The Time-Table is prepared by the college Time-Table Committee which covers both the theory and practical components of different courses in all the programmes being taught in the college. The syllabus for each course is divided into Units and subunits by the affiliating University and also the number of lectures/hours needed for its delivery. The teaching plan prepared by each department and the number of lectures prescribed for each course in the syllabus is strictly adhered to. Internal assessment tests in theory, in each		

Sheet prepared by the College Examination Committee. The evaluation of the answer scripts is completed in a time bound manner and the results are displayed in the respective departments. The grievances of the students with respect to evaluation and scores are properly addressed to the satisfaction of the students. Students failing in the internal assessment tests are counselled and given a second chance for improvement. One internal practical test in each practical subject is conducted by the concerned teaching departments in each semester. Through a series of interactive activities like group discussions, power point presentations, quizzes, debates, academic fests, the students are given practical insight into the curriculum that helps the students to develop their high order cognitive skills such as critical analysis, problem solving, evaluation and synthesis. The other initiatives undertaken by the college towards curriculum planning and development include: • CBCS curriculum as prescribed by UGC and adopted by the University of Jammu. • Providing internet facility to the students in the library. • Purchase of latest books in each course for the library both as per specific and general requirement of each course and changing syllabi every year. • Using ICT in the teaching learning process for all the science courses and some of the social-sciences courses. • Periodic tests are conducted in the effective delivery of the curriculum and assessment of the students. • All the laboratories are upgraded every year as per the requirement of the curriculum. • Industrial visits are organized to provide practical exposure to the students. • Organizing national level seminars, conferences and workshops for providing exposure to the faculty and students about the latest developments. • Skill Development courses are being offered to enhance the capabilities of the students. • Feedback received from students is acknowledged for strengthening curriculum planning and development.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback is vital part of teaching-learning process. It helps the teacher to analyze how much the students understand his/her subject being taught. With this aim our college has developed feedback systems. Student's Feedback For the academic year 2018-19, student's feedback is sought from around 347 students. Majority of the students strongly agreed that the syllabus is covered by the teachers on time. Also, majority of students almost 82 agreed that the laboratory experiences and practical exposure given to them enhanced their understanding of the concepts. From the student's feedback it is analyzed that • Majority of students are well satisfied with the curriculum development and revision. • Most of students feel the need of online feedback system, the timely uploading of relevant notices and orders on college website, more ICT facilities. • Some students are impressing for Hi-tech science labs, library etc Parent's Feedback Parent's feedback is taken from approximately 173 parents about the curriculum. About 76 of the parents expressed that the simplicity and fairness of the admission procedure of the college is excellent. Academic discipline in terms of timely conduct of lectures, practical and other activities is highly appreciated by them. From the parent's feedback it is analyzed that • They have satisfaction towards the curricular and noncurricular activities rendered by the college. • They suggested installation of more water coolers and RO in the college premises. • Some parents emphasizes on the regular cleaning of toilets, common room, classrooms, labs and college campus. • Most of the parents felt a need for more prestigious and latest books in library. • Parents suggested that campus should have WI-FI connectivity Alumni's Feedback Nearly 82 alumni were given their feedback for the academic year 2018-19. Majority of alumni rated the developmental activities rendered by the college for their overalldevelopment as highly efficient. Regarding the residential facilities, 72 of them who were in hostel rated that the food and accommodation facilities as highly efficient. Of the student teacher relationship, 70 of them rated that as highly efficient. From alumni's feedback it is analyzed that . Most of alumni have suggested to college management for having career guidance and counseling as well as placement cell Overall Analysis of Feedback The aspects pointed out by all the stakeholders are considered with special care and attention. The teachers discussed and evaluated the suggestions received from different spheres regarding the

curriculum, infrastructure, updated syllabus and latest facilities in the college. Action Taken Report For proper redressal, following steps are taken • In addition to the existing washrooms and toilets, the construction of two more large washrooms and toilets is in progress and shall be completed very shortly. • For the maintenance of washrooms and toilets, more sweepers have been engaged. • Large number of prestigious and syllabus related books have been purchased. • For more infrastructures the project of eight new classrooms is in progress. • College management is planning to have wi-fi connectivity in college campus.

Student mentoring system is available in the institution for the overall development and welfare of students. The regular as well as academic arrangement teachers act as mentors for the students. The mentors help undergraduate fresh students to understand the challenges and opportunities present in the Institute and develop a smooth transition to campus life. Mentoring of students thus, is an essential feature to render equitable service to all our students having varied background. Student-mentorship has the following aims: a. To enhance teacher-student contact hours b. To enhance students' academic performance and attendance c. To minimise student drop-out rates d. To identify and understand the status of slow learners and encourage advanced

learners e. To render equitable service to students. Students have been categorised based on the streams of studies and also according to their core subjects. They are divided into groups of 50-60 depending on the number of students and availability of teachers. Each group has been assigned a teacher-mentor who performs mentoring duties. The institutional practice of Mentoring System has been designed and implemented – a. to be student-centric b. to render equitable service to students of varied academic financial backgrounds However, with the introduction of continuous assessment under the Semester System, time factor is a constraint for Mentors. Student Mentors duty is: • To Identify strengths and weaknesses in all fields of the student mentees • To Identify hobbies and fields of their interests. • To motivate the students to attend and make use of library as much as possible. • To Guide and motivate the students to improve their results. • To Know their academic and psychological needs and guide the students accordingly • To Conduct regular counselling sessions for building discipline . • To Encourage and Orientand develop enthusiasm to participate in multi-skilled activities such as curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular. • To Collect feedback to strengthen the feedback system and achieve desired results on different aspects.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System at the Institutional Level •?Centralized Continuous Internal Evaluation System: Assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning process. As a part of sound educational strategy, the institution adopts Centralized Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System to assess all aspects of a student's development on a continuous basis throughout the year. The college adopts the method of conducting internal assessment tests both in Theory and Practical. •?Orientation on Evaluation Process: Students are made aware of the evaluation process through the following initiatives:- •? The orientation programmes at the beginning of the semester through public address system of the college by conducting interaction meet with the students. •?Teaching Plan contains evaluation procedures. •?Academic Calendar with CIA Exam dates •?Orientation on changes and amendments in the evaluation process through Tutorial Meetings •?Display on the College and Department Notice Board. •?Result Analysis Review Meeting: Result Analysis is done by the class tutors after every CIA Test. Pass percentage of each course is calculated by dividing the total number ofstudents appeared and passed in each course. The performance of the students is monitored by the Principal and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members. The Principal conducts Review Meetings department wise to give necessary feedback for the improvement of students' performance. •?Progress Report: The institution is keen on monitoring the performance of the students. There is total transparency in the evaluation system as the evaluated answer sheets are provided to the students to go through the pattern of evaluation adopted by the teachers and if there is any discrepancy in the scores/marks obtained by the concerned student he/she is free to get the modification incorporated through the concerned evaluator. In case the students are not attending their classes regularly then the teachers inform their parents and also send the answer sheets to them to see the performance of their ward and take remedial measures if needed. Whenever necessary, the tutor shall recommend the visit of the parent to the college for a discussion about the student. •?Remedial Classes are conducted for slow learners, absentees and the students whoparticipate in Sports, NCC, NSS and Cultural activities. This makesstruggling learners to update their subject knowledge and also to catch up with theirpeers. •? External examinations are conducted through University of Jammu at the end of everysemester for all the theory and practical papers. Students should satisfy the eligibilitycriteria of 75 attendance in each semester to appear for University Examination. Thestudents who have failed in some subjects are permitted to write their papers in both the semesterexaminations. •?Representation in the Board of Studies: The senior faculty members appointed by the University act as the member of Board of Studies. At every meeting they suggest evaluation reforms and discuss any discrepancy in the evaluation system. At the time of centralevaluation the examiners have the facilities to represent any out of syllabus questions. Thechairman of the evaluation Board will take necessary action. •?Supplementary Examinations are held for the students who have appeared andfailed in any one of the semester theory papers relating to completion of his/her degree. •?Reappearing/Recounting/Revaluation: The students are informed of

theReappearing/Recounting/Revaluation scheme available to them. Revaluation is permitted forstudents who apply for it within the stipulated time on payment of prescribed fee.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of Examination and other related matters: The examination calendar includes Assessment Tests of Sem-I, II, V in the first half of the academic year. A separate centralized date sheet is prepared and displayed for the students before the assessment tests. Then the centres are prepared for the conduct of University Examination

at the end of the semester. Similarly a separate calendar is prepared for semester II, IV and VI for conducting Internal Assessment tests and then for conducting University Examinations. The practical assessment Tests for science subjects in all the semesters are conducted well before the start of University Examination and the dates are displayed accordingly in the academic calendar. Other curricular and co curricular activities are also displayed in the academic calendar according to the suitability of dates. Detail of various steps involved: • Examination committee of the college in consultation with Principal of the College prepares in advance a calendar regarding the various examinations and assessment tests to be conducted throughout the academic session. • A calendar keeping in view the detail of all the working days is prepared. Total number of Lectures to be delivered during the session and time of completion of the syllabi is taken into consideration for preparing examination schedule. • The calendar outlines the semester class work schedule, internal examination schedule and external examination schedule. • The faculty members of the concerned department gather the lists of courses for the coming semester. • The head of the department finalizes the course allocation for the faculty members based on their choice and area of interest or expertise. • The faculty members prepare the lesson plan before the commencement of semester, indicating the topics to becovered lecture wise including the evaluation process for each subject and it is duly reviewed by one of the senior faculty in the department and approved by the head of the department. It is then, made available to the students. • Time table in-charge of each department prepares the timetable as per the guidelines of respective statutory bodies for the number of credit hours for each subject prior to the commencement of the semester. • Time-table is displayed in the respective department notice boards and college website. • In addition to the tests, assignments, mini-projects and

quiz are also the part of Continuous Internal Evaluation. • The evaluated answer books are returned to the students and an opportunity is given to the students to discuss the evaluation with the teacher. The teacher rectifies any error on the spot, if any. • Finally the Internal Assessment record is posted on the Internal Assessment Registers for verification by University Internal Assessment Record Checking Committee.

jointly empowered to propose design formulate and execute their plans within the framework of governance. The academic administrative, NCC, NSS, IQAC, all are working together for the smooth running and overall functioning of the college, The principal of the college decentralizes the powers to the conveners by constituting different committees. While consulting different committees' interest, aptitude and potential of the teacher is kept in view. All the faculty members are involved in various committees for active participation to ensure effective implementation of programs undertaken. Committees are constituted by the principal for one academic year or until new committees are constituted. This has created a sense of involvement and responsibility among all the staff members resulting in efficient administration in college. All functions involve many members working in various committees and providing their individual creativity and skills. With the commencement of each academic year the concentration given on the regular lectures conducted by staff, timely completion of the syllabus, guidance for better performance in the examination and providing best possible teaching and learning environment. This is attained

by regular meetings of the staff conducted by the principal from time to time. The staff receives motivation and support for all the activities.

Strategy Type	Details						
Curriculum Development	The curriculum is designed by the university of Jammu under the chairmanship of V.C. which is common for all the government/ private colleges functioning in Jammu division. University provides opportunity for suggestions though teachers conferencing and workshops. Our teachers attend workshops and meetings in other colleges as well and contribute to curriculum development. This process ensures that the teachers are updated about the domain knowledge. Faculty are engaged with the university in revision of syllabus through general body meetings (Board of studies). During the session under the guidance						

of worthy principal, the planned interaction of the pupil with teachers using all the material resources and processes for imparting quality education to the pupil was done and modern methods of instructions included lecture, reading, audio-visual demonstration and practical discussion and practice doing were followed and added in the curriculum during the session. Many other new techniques of teaching were introduced which includes modification and interactive lectures, group discussion, case study and workshop methods.

Teaching and Learning	New techniques of teaching and learning are adopted after series of meetings conducted under the chairmanship of worthy principals by almost all the teaching faculty. In these meetings the modern ways of teaching and learning were discussed to impart quality education to the students. Few of the modern techniques of teaching and learning discussed in the meeting and later adopted on the ground in classrooms are modified lectures, case study methods, workshop methods, and sometimes role play methods. One new method was also introduced which is considered to be one of the best learning methods that is "teach others," and many students were given chances to teach the class. Besides before commencement of term, academic calendar is prepared and IQAC ensure that activities are conducted as per schedule. IQAC monitors class wise, faculty wise and subject wise instruction delivery.
Examination and Evaluation	Examination and evaluation policy are designed by the university of Jammu and implemented in such a manner it accesses and improves the quality of student learning. The university prescribes the procedure and guidelines for conducting the examination in the college. A team of teachers and administrative staff plan for the smooth conduction of the theory examination. Practical examinations are conducted by the respective departments as pet the university rules and regulations. Many senior faculty members are experts to practical examinations in other institutions. Faculty members follow other communication received from the university related to examination and evaluation process. Examination committee had reinforced norms for the conduct of the examinations and made all the faculty members aware of the norms before the commencement of the examinations. Duty chart of invigilators is prepared and circulated much in advance to ensure the presence of faculty during examinations. Flying squads comprising of faculty member under the headship of the worthy principal ensure that the use of unfair means is checked. A variety of assessment methods are being used in

Research and Development	Nothing much is done in this aspect. Since the education system in this college works on the guidelines of the University of Jammu UGC. Practical knowledge and experimentation on part of learning needs to be increased. The students who have completed their graduation during the session 2018-19 from GDC Kathua have not done their original research. It is suggested that more practical oriented education needs to be introduced in the undergraduate course for generating employment. Efforts should be made to understand and link the benefits of the UG research to a student's aptitude for sciences and social sciences as well as their inclination to pursue graduate studies and eventually as research- intensive career and there in a direct/ co-ordination between UG research and higher education.

• As of now the college is dependent upon the electricity received from the electric grid. However to reduce the consumption of electricity the college has completely shifted from incandisent illumination to LED illumination, thereby reducing the power consumption for lightening to almost 15 of what was consumed earlier. • To reduce pollution and create a clean and green environment, the college has huge well maintained lawns and a botanical garden with plants of medicinal value. These open green spaces absorb carbon emission. Seminars and workshops are organized to educate about environment and sustainable

development. The college has an active Eco Club for organising such programs and activities. Field trips for biology students to create awareness and conservation of biodiversity among the students. • "Save energy" initiative has been taken by the students' union to switch off lights and fans before leaving the classroom. The students are motivated to reduce the wastage and consider buying items that are really required. The students participate in the various programmes wherein they prepare different articles from the waste materials which are later exhibited in the College. • College has a provision to speed up compositing of dry leaves and branches which enriches the ground and helps to promote the growth and development of healthy plant tissue. The college also has a pit where vermicomposting is done to produce manure. • E-waste generated is used for technical education purpose by using the hardware in the labs for display. As the college always strives to be abreast with the new technologies, the waste seems to be expanding. E-waste management has become an immediate long time concern. Implementation of e-waste inventory management system so as to further enhance the responsibility of the institution in preventing the direct exposure of students to the unused electronic items. • Celebrated Swacchta Pakhwara from 1st to 14th August 2018 for cleanliness drives within the college campus and some areas of town spreading awareness about the importance of clean and green environment. Organised a seminar on "Role of youth in Swacchta on 24.08.2018. E-waste Corner Evidence of Success: The community service extended to the adopted village dwellers has been rewarding. Most of the villages are aware about maintaining personal health and hygiene. Village streets which were once stinky due to poor sanitation are now clean. Most of the households have constructed toilets and open defecation has almost stopped. Villages and college students themselves are marching towards being totally plastic free in the years to come. Tree cutting has reduced in the area. Compost pit has been constructed in the college to harmlessly decompose the college waste into manure. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The NSS units of the college has a separate committee with energetic young and senior teachers. The college authority extends all-encompassing support. The committee takes decisions on regular activities and special camp activities through periodic meetings. The limited grant allotted by the Government is a constraint in itself. Apart from this sometimes the volunteers find it difficult to encourage locals to invest adequate time in learning. " Special National Integration Camps", " National Integration Camp", "Trekking Camps", "Regular Army Attachment Camp", Training Capsules at Officers Training Academy (OTA)", "Indian Military Academy Camp (IMA)","Basic Leadership Camp", "Advanced Leadership Camp", "Rock Climbing Camp", "Combined Annual Training Camps", "Annual Training Camps", Republic Day Camp at New Delhi" and above all the NCC's Most Prestigious Camp named as "Youth Exchange Programme" in which the college NCC cadets have visited different countries. On an average of 100 to 120 NCC Cadets of the college are deputed to attend the above mentioned Camps, throughout the year. The NCC Cadets of the college, are not only excelling in the above mentioned camps by winning various Medals, Trophies and Merit Positions and bringing laurels to the institution, but they carry out

various Campaigns, Drives and Rallies naming a few such as "Awareness Campaigns regarding the ill Effects of Eating Tobacco, Consuming Liquor, Early Child Marriage etc" , " Cleanliness Drives inside as well as outside the Campus" , "Plantation Drive", "Mass Awareness Rallies" etc as a routine matter. The NCC Cadets of the college also raise funds through voluntary donations for social causes, Natural Calamities and for the Armed Forces and War Widows on the eve of the Armed Forces Flag Day on 7th of December every year. The Cadets also visit The Old Age Home regularly to spend some time with the inmates and entertain them by presenting Cultural Items. In addition to this the NCC Cadets also participate actively in the "Traffic Week Celebration" being organized by the Motor Vehicle Department , every year with the rationale of making the Motorists aware about the Traffic rules and encourage them to follow the instructions and rules made by the Motor Vehicle Department to enjoy their safe driving. Most of the cadets get motivated for Army services. Cadets are enthusiastically involved in community and social services. Leadership qualities observed in cadets. Most of the NCC Cadets actively participated in various college activities and acting as a grooming leader. Problems encountered and Resources required • With the implementation of the semester system from 2014, there is a clash of some NCC camps with the Semester end examinations which is discouraging cadets from attending these camps. • Due to shortage of NCC instructors at the Bn Hqs, college is mainly dependent upon the senior cadets for drill training and preparing for events like local Republic Day and Independence Day parades. • According to University statute, the maximum number of duties availed by a student during a semester is 15 whereas more than a month is required for cadets who are selected for pre RD and RD Camps for RD parade at new Delhi. • A separate office and changing room is required for NCC, which has not become possible for the last many years as the college is already facing the shortage of space.
